
These are the skills the students should know and be able to do at each grade level.

At the end of third grade, students are expected to be able to read independently.

This means they can read and understand words, sentences and paragraphs without help.



Third grade minimum reading requirements ask the student to demonstrate AT LEAST a limited ability to determine the meaning of words using appropriate strategies, apply reading comprehension and literary analysis skills, and locate, interpret and organize information for a variety of purposes from grade-appropriate texts.






The FSA-ELA measures students' progress on the LAFS. (LAFS means Language Arts Florida Standards) Students in grades 3-10 take the tests each spring. Third graders are tested in reading (and math).

Scores range from one to five. Level 5 is the highest; Level 1 is the lowest.

The third-grade FSA-ELA has students reading stories....

* approximately 500 words long * followed by questions about what they read * using charts, graphs, maps and other material to gather information to
